Each user's detox will vary depending on their usage history; but in general, this process takes 5-7 days and can last up to 2 weeks.

REHABILITATION AND THERAPY

Once the mind and body have been cleared of the drug, and the user is medically stable, the treatment process can continue. This is

where the intense internal work begins. During this time clients are exposed to a spectrum of treatment approaches such as:

- **COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL THERAPY (CBT):** Intended to change negative thought patterns and behaviors related to drug use.
